She had a quirky sense of humor and was loyal friend and, she was a Lady.

She volunteered through her church and community throughout her life. She was a devoted member of P.E.O., a philanthropic women's organization supporting educational needs of women. She was also a member of The Carter Society.

She was predeceased by her husbands, Frederick William Kraft and John Haberer. She delighted in her children, many grandchildren and great grandchildren.
